STRENGTHENING OF PROTECTED AREAS - CaMPAM Network and Forum -



- Strengthening of MPAs through activities of the CaMPAM Network and Forum:
 - Develop partnerships with donors on business plans for MPAs
 - Further engagement resource team (CLRT)
 - Capacity building: GCFI conferences, MPA better practices, mentorship network and small grants:
 - Sustainable economic activities
 - MPA zoning and regulations
 - Conflict resolution
 - Community awareness

STRENGTHENING OF PROTECTED AREAS

- CaMPAM Network and Forum -



- Enhance communications and exchanges on MPA issues through CaMPAM eGroup
- Training of Trainers programme
 - Regional Course, DomRep June 2010
 - Regional Course in 2011, primarily for Caribbean Challenge countries on specific MPA needs
 - Follow-up local training for countries at the 2009-2011 trainings
- Continue enhancement MPA database, use for initial management effectiveness assessment and link to the MPA data gathered for the PA listing process

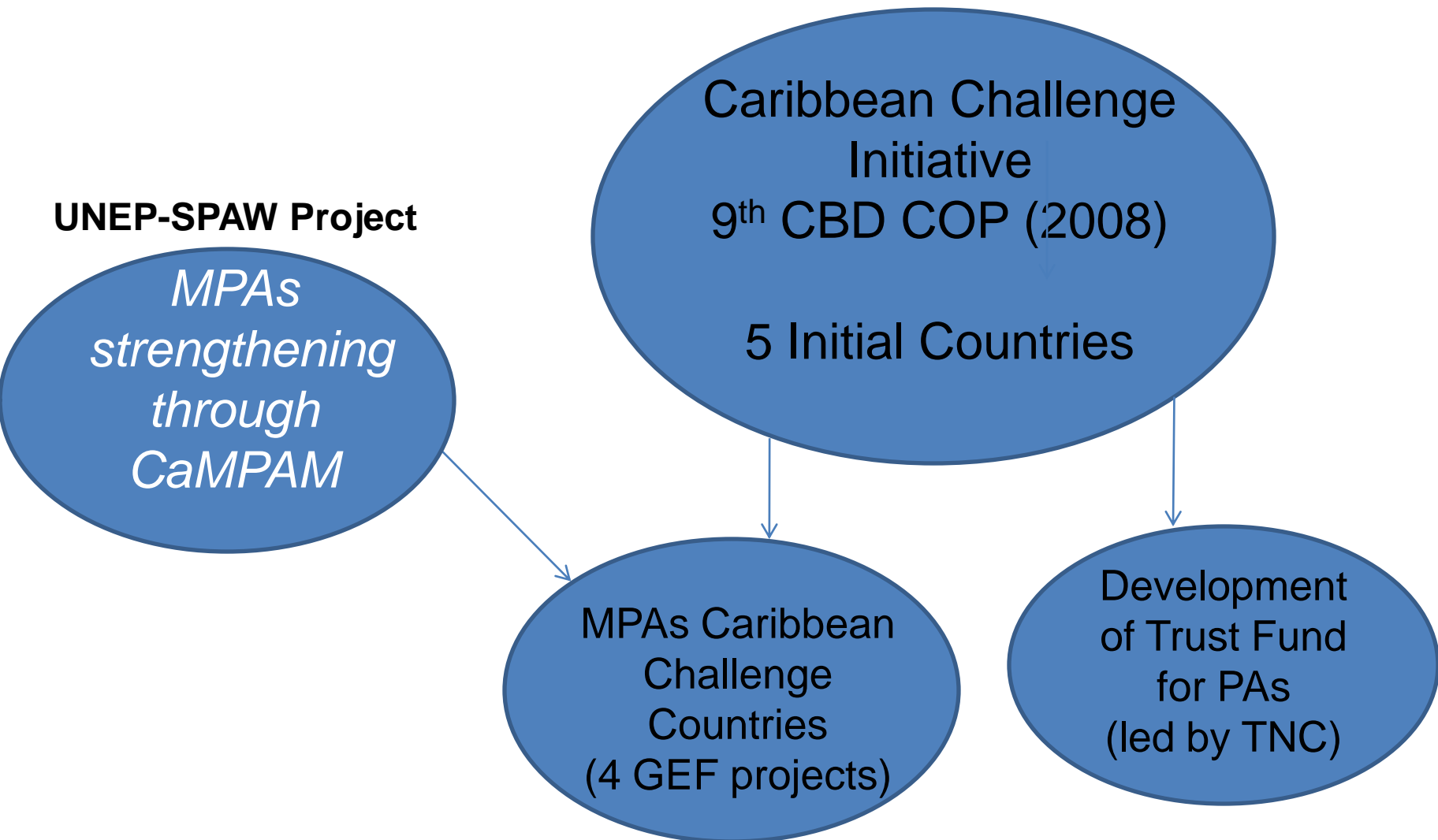
UNEP SPAW Project – *Italian funding*

- Training on MPA management needs (targetted /regional)
- Establishment of MPA networks
- Harmonization of ecological and socio-economic indicators and monitoring for effectiveness
- MPA database and facilitate MPA status reports
- Promote listing of MPAs under the SPAW Protocol and new Parties

STRENGTHENING OF PROTECTED AREAS - Support to the Caribbean Challenge -



Geographic Scope: Wider Caribbean, emphasis on GEF-supported countries:
Antigua & Barbuda, Bahamas, Dominican Republic, Grenada, Jamaica, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines

Goals:

- Support these countries' commitment to protect 20% marine resources
- Biologically representative, resilient and functional MPA networks
- Assist with sustainable financing at these protected areas
- Create demonstration sites showcasing conservation and management best practices that can be replicated

STRENGTHENING OF PROTECTED AREAS

- Support to Caribbean Challenge -



Major activities:

- Assist with MPA networks development, national & transboundary
- Enhance capacity: targeted and regional training, exchanges, etc
- Harmonise ecological and socioeconomic monitoring and indicators for MPA effectiveness
- Information gathering and enhanced database of MPAs
- Networking and sharing of information and better practices, within and outside the region and coordination with GLISPA
- Regional coordination forum and meeting

GUIDELINES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF PROTECTED AREAS AND SPECIES



- Continue pilot activity on protected area listing (*UNEP(DEPI)/CAR IG.29.3*):
 - Formal listing of the 9 PAs proposed and database linked to CaMPAM
 - Other Parties to propose PAs and review by the STAC
- Develop criteria to assess exemptions to Article 11 (eGroup start)
- Reactivate the eGroup on SPAW species criteria and Parties to initiate review of species requiring attention, for presentation to V STAC Meeting

CONSERVATION OF THREATENED AND ENDANGERED SPECIES



- Conservation of marine mammals
 - Follow-up to stranding workshops
 - Information gathering/database & habitats map
 - Whale watching regional Workshop and guidelines
 - Activities of manatee Regional management
 - Enhanced discussions at MM eGroup
 - *Information on captures from fishing*
 - *Workshop on pollution and contaminants*

- Develop proposal on spatial planning and habitat corridors for MM conservation. Funding opportunity under LifeWeb/Spain Government

CONSERVATION OF THREATENED AND ENDANGERED SPECIES



- Conservation of sea turtles with WIDECAST
 - Recovery Action Plans implementation (proposals on alternative livelihoods and foraging areas/important habitats)
- Conservation of birds with SCSCB & BirdLife
 - Support ongoing capacity building efforts (bird ID cards, waterbird census training)

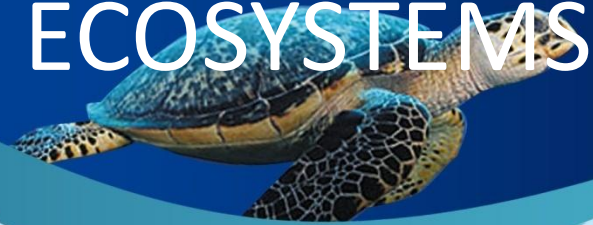


- Invasive Alien Species

- Co-operation with CABI on project for insular Caribbean to include marine invasives issues into regional strategy; and facilitate transfer of lessons learnt to other countries

- Participation at ICRI/Mexico regional workshop on lion fish and continue to share information (movement, safe handling,) with countries and organisations working on this issue

CONSERVATION AND SUSTAINABLE USE OF COASTAL AND MARINE ECOSYSTEMS



- Management and Conservation of Reef Biodiversity and Reef Fisheries CLME pilot project
 - Strengthening of SeaFlower Biosphere Reserve (Colombia) and Pedro Bank (Jamaica) management frameworks and governance
 - Harmonise fisheries management at transboundary sites in Hispaniola (Haiti/DomRep)
 - Promote Ecosystem Based Management Approach
 - Foster networking and cooperation among countries
 - Community and stakeholder involvement
- Continue to support ICRI and reef monitoring at subregional nodes
